Since 2024 we have been the leading organization for *The Dean Martin Hometown Festival* in Steubenville, Ohio. In 2025 we became a member of The Jefferson County Chamber.

As Mayor of Steubenville, Ohio, I welcome you to our celebration of "The King of Cool", native son Dean Martin.


Born Dino Crocetti, he became a world-renowned singer, actor and entertainer in movies and television, bringing humor and light to the world.





CINDY WILLIFORD, DMA vice president and architect of this year's event, traces the history and evolution of Dean's very own festival.

> hen I was approached to lead the annual festival for Dean Martin in his hometown of Steubenville, Ohio, I accepted the role with heartfelt honor and a steadfast commitment to celebrate Dean's legacy. I endeavored to bring renewed energy,

For three decades, Steubenville has embraced its most famous native son with heartfelt devotion, civic pride, and a deep sense of cultural heritage.

The Dean Martin Hometown Festival, which began in 1996 as Dean Martin Day, has blossomed, drawing fans from around the world to the Ohio Valley each June.

As of 2025, the festival celebrates its 29th year - no small feat in the ever-shifting landscape of small-town America. The longevity of the event is a testament not only to Dean's enduring popularity, but also to the dedication of Steubenville's citizens, organizers, volunteers, and loyal fans.

Dean grew up on the working-class streets of Steubenville's South End. His rise from a local boy of Italian descent to a world-famous singer, actor, and television icon has long been a point of pride for Steubenville residents.


When he passed away on Christmas Day in 1995, his death reawakened interest in his life and work everywhere, and nowhere moreso than Steubenville.

While there had been smaller, informal efforts to honor Dean in the past, Mayor Domenick Mucci Jr recognized the deep connection between Dean and his hometown upon his death.

To honor Dean's legacy and celebrate his ties to the city, Mayor Mucci initiated the establishment of The Dean Martin Festival Committee (DMFC), which was led by Deana Martin and her husband, John Griffeth. He also connected with Rose Angelica to assist with the planning of the 1996 event, that was to be held at St. Anthony's Church. This inaugural celebration would be the catalyst of what would become The Dean Martin Festival and now, from 2025 onwards, The Dean Martin Hometown Festival.

Mayor Mucci's vision was to create a festival that not only paid tribute to Dean's career, but would also be instrumental in bringing the community together.

The festival had a modest beginning in 1996, sparked by a combination of grassroots efforts and civic support.



Those early supporters included city leaders and devoted fans who believed Dean's name should live on in a tangible, hometown way.

Though early versions of the event were simple, the community's passion and consistent support has allowed it to flourish.

It was through the leadership of Rose Angelica during those formative years which laid a solid foundation for what would become an annual tradition, attracting fans from around the world to celebrate Dean's legacy.

Rose was hugely instrumental in transforming a local tribute into a celebrated event that honors Dean's legacy and enriches the cultural history of Steubenville.

The festival went from being a gathering of local people who knew and loved Dean, to an event which expanded its offerings to include a variety of activities that appeal to a broad audience. These activities range from parades to musical performances to karaoke contests to meatballeating competitions.

Such diverse programming not only observes Dean's multifaceted career but also provides entertainment that resonates with attendees of all ages.

As it was the vision of Mayor Mucci for the festival to be more than a tribute to Dean, so it was the same for Rose, who served as chairperson of the DMFC for several years.

From the very beginning, the fans and community stepped up - not just to attend, but to actively build the festival year after year.

As The Dean Martin Association has worked over the past year planning the upcoming 2025 festival, we have become very aware of what Dean meant to Steubenville.

One of those individuals who has been instrumental in the building of the festival is Lou Martini Jr. where he has served as Master of Ceremonies, a position he has held for over 15 years. His presence has significantly enriched the festival's offerings and strengthened its connection to Dean's legacy. He is also key in hosting events, introducing performers, and engaging with the attendees, thereby ensuring the festival's smooth operation and vibrant atmosphere.

In addition to these duties, Lou frequently serves as the Grand Marshal of the festival's parade, leading the procession and symbolizing the spirit of celebration. Beyond the ceremonial duties, Lou actively participates in various festival events. His presence at such events enhances the festival's appeal and offers attendees the opportunity to interact with a seasoned actor who shares their admiration of The King of Cool, Dean Matin.

It is through Lou's consistent involvement that has helped maintain the festival's prominence, attracting visitors from various regions and ensuring that Dean's legacy continues to be celebrated with enthusiasm and respect. The many attributes of Lou have significantly enhanced the festival's appeal and ensures its ongoing success as a cherished community event.

The heart and soul of the festival has always been its people.

While some festivals are corporate-led and funded, the Dean Martin Hometown Festival has remained volunteer driven, created and sustained by people with a deep love for both Dino and Steubenville, as well as raising funds for local charities. From teachers and retired steelworkers to young volunteers and lifelong fans, individuals have poured their time, resources, and creativity into making each year's event a success.

One such volunteer is lifelong resident of Steubenville, Joe "JoJo" DiAlbert who is the owner of The Spot Bar. JoJo has been instrumental in the Dean Martin Hometown Festival for nearly 3 decades. Again, what began as a modest gathering in 1996 of those folks who gathered at St. Anthony's for the first Dean Martin Day, through the combined efforts of other enthusiasts, initiated gatherings to celebrate Dean's music at The Spot Bar as well as at other venues in and around Steubenville.

These gatherings were nothing more than people singing Dean's songs over cassette tapes, reflecting a deep appreciation for Dean's contribution to the music industry.

It was this small beginning which paved the way for it to become a significant annual event attracting visitors worldwide. Soon, under the leadership of the DMFC, the event attracted Dean Martin impersonators, big performances band and various tribute acts.

The expansion not only honored Dean's legacy but also proved a boost to local tourism.

The festival had a long history of successful years. However, in 2021, it also faced some challenging periods when it faced uncertainty.

It was during those challenging periods that JoJo stayed a steadfast supporter and armed with determination to continue the tradition regardless of the uncertainty they were facing. It was his resilience that ensured the festival's future when it seemed uncertain.

JoJo's contagious dedication is manifested in many ways: the folks who decorate trailers and cars for the parade, the small business owners who decorate shop windows, sell Dean Martin themed merchandise or sponsor festival events... There are tribute artists and musicians, some traveling from hundreds of miles away, who perform simply out of love for Dean's music. Civic groups provide venues, volunteers, and promotional help. And let us not forget the generations of families who return year after year, teaching their children and grandchildren about this fellow named Dean Martin and what he means to Steubenville.

The festival is a deeply interactive community-created event. It embodies a rare form of civic storytelling. Every year the town collectively retells the story of Dean Martin through its own voice, lenses, and heart.

While Steubenville provides the backdrop and the foundation, it is the Dean Martin fans from across the country and even around the world - who are essential to the festival's success.

Many of these people return year after year, not just for entertainment, but for the camaraderie and personal connection they feel for Dino's legacy. Some have even become honorary citizens of Steubenville in their own right, known

→ These fans often contribute more than their attendance. Some donate to festival causes by promoting the event on social media or serve as unofficial ambassadors. Others bring gifts, memorabilia or help drive turnout by inviting new fans to discover Steubenville.

The comm on thread?

A shared reverence for a man whose voice, humor and presence left a lasting imprint on American culture.

This two-way bond between city and fan base has kept the festival energized. It is more than nostalgia, more than a traditional convention so prevalent in other media circles (such as Marvel, DC, Star Wars, ComicCon etc) - it is an evolving relationship between a town and the world, united by one man's legacy.

Each June, the festival breathes life into the community. Hotels are filled. Restaurant's bustle. Local artisans sell their wares. Out of towners discover Steubenville's other charms, from its historic murals to its scenic hills. For a town that has been in decline because of the steel industry and population loss, the Dean Martin Hometown Festival remains one of the most visible and vital sources of positive identity.

No 29-year journey is without its challenges. In recent years, questions emerged about whether the festival could remain sustainable as founding organizers aged or stepped back. Financial hurdles, volunteer shortages, COVID-19 and changing cultural trends occasionally posed threats. The pandemic itself brought unprecedented revisions to in-person events, requiring the festival to pause and/or reimagine certain traditions.

But each time, the community rose to the occasion. New generations of volunteers stepped in. Organizers adapted, introduced fresh programming, and leaned on loyal supporters to keep the spirit alive.

In some years, scaled-down events were held - but the message remained constant: Dean Martin will not be forgotten in Steubenville, Ohio.

One of the most visible acts of revival came in the mid-2010s and 2020s when efforts were made to professionalize some aspects of the festival while retaining its hometown charm. This included more structured sponsorship campaigns, expanded media coverage, and new digital marketing strategies.

The inclusion of Dean Martin-themed merchandise, commemorative T-shirts, and enhanced social media outreach also helped engage younger fans and spread awareness across various social media platforms.

The live entertainment is still one of the festivals' most beloved aspects, especially performances by Dean Martin tribute artists. These performers, such as Joe Scalissi, Felix Deneau, and Tom Stevens, have given new life to Dino's catalog, not as impersonation but as celebration.

Tribute performances are more than a gimmick; they are emotional experiences. When a singer croons "Everybody Loves Somebody" or "That's Amore" on the streets and in the venues of Dean's hometown, the crowd is not just hearing a song - they are transported to a different time, connected to a common memory. The ongoing support and participation of tribute artists from across the country has allowed the festival to offer high-quality entertainment while reinforcing its core mission: keeping Dean's music alive and accessible.

The most remarkable aspect of the Dean Martin Hometown Festival is making sure community members of all ages and backgrounds can enjoy the event, whether through accessible venues, diverse entertainment options, or activities that reflect the rich cultural heritage of Steubenville.

Though rooted in Steubenville, Ohio, it belongs to Dean's fans across generations, regions, and backgrounds. Whether someone grew up listening to Dean on the radio, discovered him through old movies, or found a personal connection to his smooth, effortless charm, everyone is welcomed to the fold.

Children dance in the street to songs like "Volare (Nel Blu Dipinto Di Blu)". Seniors recall their favorite films. Local teens compete for the Dean Martin Association Scholarship. Visitors walk the same streets Dino once did. And through it all, there is a shared joy which binds them Organizers breathing new life into Dean

together: Dean Martin.



When the planning for the 2025 festival began in August 2024, the Dean Martin Association connected with businesses, past festival leaders and community leaders and researched into what made the previous 28 years so special

We listened to what worked in those formative years, as well as what didn't go over well. We gathered old schedules and other documents to review. We chatted with our members on our social media platforms. One by one, we compiled our baseline itinerary of what the festival should look like.

The Dean Martin Association has reintroduced and expanded various events for this year's festival. We have brought back the parade, the 50s street dance and meatball eating contest while adding the First Annual Dean Martin Association Charity Golf Scramble which benefits the Ohio Valley Health Center, as well as the MDA & Martin and Lewis Telethon which will benefit the Muscular Dystrophy Association.

These events and others aim to engage a broader audience and pay tribute to Dean's multifaceted career. Partnering with The Harmonium Project, the DMA has worked to make the festival more inclusive and accessible.

Efforts include organizing live music performances, blocking off Fourth Street for vendors and activities and integrating community groups into the festivities. It is through these efforts that the DMA has significantly contributed to the resurgence and enrichment of the 2025 Dean Martin Hometown Festival, ensuring that the legacy of the "King of Cool" continues to be celebrated with the enthusiasm and reverence it deserves.

As the festival enters its 30th year in 2026, organizers are not only reflecting on the past - we are planning.

One ongoing goal of the city and the festival has been to install a permanent statue of Dean in his hometown. This effort, which was spearheaded by fans and civic leaders, reflects the belief that his legacy deserves a lasting, physical tribute in the town that shaped him. The continuing campaign for the statue highlights the festival's commitment to both remembrance and renewal. Through a connection made with the Italian American Cultural Club in Steubenville, we are now positioned even more so for that goal to be fulfilled. What a tribute it would be to erect this at the Dean Martin Hometown Festival in 2026.

My own vision is clear: to preserve the spirit of Dean while growing the festival into a first-class celebration that honors his music, heritage and enduring connection to Steubenville. The Dean Martin Hometown Festival is more than a tribute - it is a triumph of community, memory, and enduring affection. For 29 years, fans and residents alike have nurtured an event that celebrates not only a star, but a shared sense of identity and joy. They have shown that legacy is not only something we inherit - it is something we create, together.

The Dean Martin Hometown Festival 2025 promises to be one of the most memorable yet. •

DANIEL BERTENSHAW, exclusively shares his family memories and photos of time spent at Dean's beautiful homes. Daniel Bertenshaw's grandmother Hilda was a housekeeper originally from Middleton, UK, and based in California.

Having worked for an agency, she was assigned to manage the homes for a number of Hollywood stars, and in the late 1970s/early 1980s her job took her behind the scenes and behind the closed doors of the houses of Dean Martin.

Daniel would fly out to visit his grandmother, with his parents, staying in Dean's houses, even on occasion meeting the great man himself. Daniel will always cherish the moment Dean tousled his



rank Sinatra and Dean Martin have always shared their love of music and performing, but they also had a mutual attraction to the game of golf.

It was golf icon Arnold Palmer who once said, 'Golf is deceptively simple and endlessly complicated; it satisfies the soul and frustrates the intellect. It is at the same time rewarding and maddening – and it is without a doubt the greatest game mankind has ever invented.'

So let's swing back in time when Frank and Dean, and their Rat Pack clan, engaged fully in the game of golf and other Las Vegas fun.

Reporter Mike Jamison of *The Golf Wire*, posted online April 8, 2020 that, 'During the 1960s, The (Las Vegas) National played host to the big names of the Strip. The Rat Pack frequently played golf, then spent time in the bar, entertaining around the piano.'

After their golf outing, gathering in the clubhouse bar was fitting for Frank and his Clan. But perhaps Frank was more interested in the camaraderie of those club moments, rather than actually playing the game.

Some say Sinatra wasn't very serious about the game of golf, but he wasn't lacking the ability, as discussed by Stewart Weiner in the online article, Swing-A-Ding (palmspringslife.com, September 30, 2024). Weiner reports, 'It wasn't that he (Frank) didn't have the chops. Ace golf writer Barry Salberg recalled on golf.com that Sinatra was a fair player, with a rhythmic swing and a good short game. Those are descriptions most golfers would like included in their obits. Sinatra had a sense of humor about his game. Lucille Ball's husband, the late Gary Morton, told writer Salberg about a match at Tamarisk Country Club where he watched while Sinatra kept at it, at one point reminding the chairman of the board that, clearly, the ball had no idea whom it was messing with. 'Frank went up to the ball and said I'm Frank Sinatra. I'm a very big recording star. The next shot was super.' Perhaps it was that belief that was the genesis for the Frank Sinatra Invitational, which took place in November 1963. Sinatra knew golf tournaments were a great way to raise money for charity. They were also a good excuse to fraternize with buddies. As a template, he looked to the Palm Springs Desert Golf Classic. It had begun in 1960 and featured major Hollywood celebrities and pro golfers playing together. Sinatra pulled out all the stops for his tournament. At one point he even suggested that each guest receive a gold putter, an idea eventually deemed impractical for play. He invited major Hollywood and sports superstars. His press agent at the time, La Quinta resident Jim Mahoney, remembers assembling the list of the biggest names in show business and athletics and getting 100 percent RSVP acceptance. 'Frank asked you to come, you came,' he says.'

And many superstars came again, years later, on February 29, 1992, for another of Frank's popular and charitable golf invitationals.

Howard Murray, son of comedian Jan Murray, sent me a photo of a remembrance from the 1992 Frank Sinatra Ce-

lebritu Invitational. The memento was given to Jan and all attendees, leading Howard to recall that his dad frequently played golf with Dean Martin, as he states, Frank had an annual Golf Tournament in Palm Springs for many years that Dad played in. The picture I sent was with a bottle of champagne in the hotel room where Dad stayed. Dad played golf with Dean many times. I don't recall Frank ever playing in the tournaments. I do have some 'swag' somewhere from those times.'

Dean's passion for golf was a bit different than Frank's, as relayed by both his daughters Gail and Deana.

In an article posted online (August 16, 2007) by thestar.com, Gail Martin was quoted as saying, 'mostly dad was just a golfer, who would beg off a night of carousing with Sinatra and Sammy Davis Jr. in order to make an early tee time. He didn't stay up late and carouse. When dad was there with Frank and Sammy and they did the whole Rat Pack (thing) ... he'd hang out with them a little bit but other than that, normally it was no way. He just didn't want to.' A typical Dean Martin day was an early round of golf, an afternoon of gin – the card game – and then dinner with the family, she said. Afterwards, they'd watch television.


Deana Martin confirms her dad's love of golf, sharing her thoughts with the staff of closerweekly.com in an article posted online on December 16, 2020:

After family and performing, Dean's next biggest passion was golf. If he wasn't working, he would get up early, have breakfast and go play golf all day,' Deana dishes, noting that even when he wasn't on the links, the sport wasn't far from Dean's mind. He would often walk around the house holding a golf club,' she reminisces. We had thick green carpets that looked like a fairway and he would practice his swing and his grip.' Dean joked about his obsession with the sport. He told Deana, 'Do you know why I work? It's so I can pay for you kids and play golf.'

The King of Cool was an avid golfer, dedicated to his family and the game of golf. But on or off the links, and especially in Las Vegas, Frank and Dean enjoyed good times together, with perhaps a bit of creative invention on the side! Many may not know this, but sources have stated that the duo were responsible for inventing the beverage golf cart!

Imagine that!

Nick Piastowski on golf.com (November 28, 2021) verifies this via Amanda Balionis of the TNT Network: The Desert Inn Golf Club, once catered specifically to a few of its higher-end clientele, and golfers haven't gone thirsty since. From here, since this is Balionis' story, it's only right that we quote her directly from the TNT broadcast... It has a ton of history on these grounds,' Balionis said. But nothing more in line with Las Vegas lifestyle more than this story. Take a listen to this. Dean Martin and Frank Sinatra used to tee it up here, but they would never play an entire 18 unless cocktails were provided. So what happened? Desert Inn, as it was called at the time, said we have a solution for this. We're going to create a golf cart, but stock it full of all of the possible cocktails that Dean Martin and Frank Sinatra could possibly want. So yes, you're hearing this right: You can thank Dean Martin and Frank Sinatra for inventing the beverage cart. And what better place for it to be invented than right here in Las Vegas. Of course, like a lot of great inventions, there could have been another beverage cart or three somewhere else in the world before this. But we oh so want to believe that two of the members of the Rat Pack made it happen.' •



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teubenville, Ohio - a town rich in history - has always held a special place in my heart. Nestled along the banks of the Ohio River, it's a city that thrives on a strong sense of community, the hard work of its citizens, and a deep appreciation for its heritage comprised of different nationalities.

Dino Crocetti is not just a faraway icon, but someone with whom I and many others here share roots - his family is from the same part of Italy that my family is from, he worshiped in the same church as my family (St. Anthony), and he is a symbol of what Steubenville represents: perseverance, charisma, and an enduring love for life.

Celebrating Dean Martin began in 1996 as a small homage to honor his contributions to music, film, and comedy.

Thanks to Rose Angelica, The Spot Bar and other organizers, it has grown into an event, a festival, that over the years has attracted fans from around the world.

Each June, Steubenville comes alive with the sound of his timeless melodies. There are live performances, impersonators, and heartfelt tributes that remind us all why his legacy endures.



Steubenville native MICHAEL ZINNO shares how Dean Martin's legacy has influenced and shaped his life, friendships and community.

The festival is so much more than just an event that takes place every Father's Day weekend; it's a yearly reunion with my always-expanding Dean Martin family.

For my wife Tamara, our children Joe and Bella, our parents, extended relatives and me, the Dean Martin festival for these nearly 30 years has been a constant highlight that we discuss and cherish year-round.

This personal reflection on my involvement with the festival would not be complete without a proper and very fond acknowledgement of our dear neighbors, Mike and Mary Vecchione.

Mary was actually a relative of Dean's!

Shortly after Dean passed away in 1995, Steubenville organized the first memorial tribute to him the following year, on his birthday, June 7...giving way to what would become the official annual festival.

At this initial celebration, Mary asked Tamara and me to record in writing some of her sentiments about her cousin Dean.

Oh, how we wish we had a video recording or paper copy of Mary's memories.

Looking back on the event, I think we were hooked from this moment on. (Tamara and I were married in 1996, so our marriage journey is precisely aligned with the Dean Martin Festival timeline; coincidence? I think not.)



Each year, in between the festival's various events, our backyard becomes a meeting place for so many. Local friends along with a core group of die-hard Dean Martin fans and impersonators stop by for Saturday afternoon dinner. Everyone then heads back to the festival for the evening and the conclusion of the scheduled events. Then, those that are brave enough return to our backyard for a late-night gathering, which we consider to be the official unofficial festival wrap-up.

We have met Dean Martin enthusiasts from Baltimore, Cleveland, and Pittsburgh, Michigan, Nevada, New York, Texas, and Wisconsin, and even Canada - and these friends have become some of our dearest.

Every June, we resume right where we left off a year earlier, as if we have been friends our entire lives.

The festival is an opportunity to connect with people who share a love for Dean Martin and everything he represents. From the cheerful atmosphere of the streets and bars to the nostalgia-filled moments of the performances, the festival always feels like stepping back into a simpler, more elegant era.

This year, 2025, for what is now known as the Dean Martin Hometown Festival, several exciting new dimensions are part of the celebrations.

One key event is the inaugural Dean Martin Association Charity Golf Scramble, which is set to bring together fans, community members, and local businesses in a fun and

We asked DMA members and friends how Dino leaves an indelible mark on all of us... It's June 2002. I am in a rehearsal room in London's famous West End, attending an audition for a UK and Ireland tour of a show called *The Ratpack - Live from Las Vegas*. I have been asked to prepare a Dean Martin song and be prepared to read.

My knowledge of Dean Martin at that point was that he started out as part of a double act with Jerry Lewis, he was friends with Frank Sinatra and occasionally made films with him. More importantly he was Matt Helm! As 'Dean the singer' I was familiar with "That's Amore" (who wasn't) "Volare (Nel Blu Dipinto Di Blu)" and "Everybody Loves Somebody". That was about the extent of it.

I bought a CD and a book containing some Martin piano accompaniments. I thought I'd avoid the more obvious ones, I'd sing "Let Me Go Lover". I thought it showed his more vulnerable side, a song about a guy who loved this girl but she didn't love him but wanted his love anyway... You don't want me, but you want me to go on wanting you... I knew I did a good job of telling the story of the song and hoped I'd added enough of Dean's instantly recognizable phrasing and low vibrato.

I must have done okay because I was offered the job! About 6 months into the tour and after any many script changes (mostly made by me as the writer hadn't really got a handle on the humor!) we played a Sunday show at the London Palladium, where Dean himself had last played in 1987. It was packed. The show went down really well and

as a result had interest from West End theaters.

An actor friend of mine came to see the show and loved it. He said to me, 'You've got him down, you steal the show, you could be doing this for 20 years!'

That's why I love Dean Martin. My pal was right! His gift to me was his talent, his style, his voice, his easy going personality. I am not a Dean tribute. Although I pay tribute to him. I am an actor who found a guy I could relate to. I loved my sport (played soccer to a high level and took coaching badges); Dean loved his sport.

Do we have anything else in common? Quite a few children. I have four.

I occasionally ask myself, 'Should I have run with this

character for so long? Should I have taken a different carter trajectory?' Well, when you love something and someone, it's hard to give it up, especially when it affords you so many opportunities and chances. For instance, I got to meet Sir Geoff Hurst. He's a highly-decorated retired British soccer player. He brought his wife, daughter and grandson to a West End show I had been performing in. I was very surprised when he came to visit me in my dressing room. They say you shouldn't

They say you shouldn't meet your heroes. Well, he could not have been nicer, kinder and more interested in me than me in him! I got to meet him again about a month later at a Lady Taverners ball at The Hilton, Park Lane in London, for Joan Collins. He saw me and came over to me and said, 'Nice to see you again, Mark!' That wouldn't have happened had I not been playing Dean Martin.

Everywhere I meet people who love Dean and what he stands for.


